About member mission: we assume that the primary agents of God's mission in today's world are the laity in their daily places – their homes, their work, their local community, the wider world, their leisure, their spiritual health, and their church's life and its outreach. We provide tested resources to help members to discern their missions in each of those places; and to help the clergy and lay leaders of their church to make supporting the members in their daily living as Christians its primary purpose – or, at least, one of its primary purposes.

For: the ordained leaders of congregations and one co-leader (where possible); ecumenical with Methodists and Baptists already using the resources.

Purpose: participants will leave with the skills to begin to implement member mission in their congregations.

The institute offers:

- practice in following the basic steps to implement member mission for individuals, pairs, or small groups; and into the life of the congregation as a whole
- practice in the basic interpersonal, group process, system, and feedback skills needed to implement member mission
- ongoing consultation for three years

Participants commit themselves to (see Registration form):

- advance reading of the basic text and workbook for member mission and written preparation – bring all with you to the Institute (all to be sent to you after 8/17/09)
- implement three activities in your congregation each year for three years
- participate in coaching during this three year period

More about the Institute:

- space is limited – apply by 9/15/09
- most of the learning will occur in small groups
- lodging in single rooms
- arrive in time for dinner at 6:00 PM on 10/11/09 and leave after breakfast on 10/16/09

Background information about member mission and its developers, A. Wayne Schwab and the member mission team

Member mission assumes that the primary agents of God's mission in today's world are the laity in their daily places – their homes, their work, their local community, the wider world, their leisure, their spiritual health, and their church's life and its outreach. We offer resources to help members to discern their missions in each of those places; and to help the clergy and lay leaders of their church to make supporting the members in their daily living as Christians its primary purpose – or, at least, one of its primary purposes. Among ways to implement this approach, we offer the Member Mission Leadership Institute which gives participants practice in every step to start the use of member mission in their church. They will also receive a taste of basic skills in human relations, group process, and systems. As we present them, appreciative inquiry and emotional intelligence resonate with these three areas. My own training in these areas began with my years at the center of the group process, systems, and consultation training of ECUSA from 1956 - 1970; 19 productive years as a parish priest in Montvale, NJ, 1956-1975; and 19 years as the Episcopal Church's first-ever evangelism staff person, 1975-1993. Member mission has emerged out of all those experiences and, most recently, out of research funded by Trinity Church Grants (NYC), 1999-2000.

There are some unique keys that make the member mission approach unique in the midst of all the attention being given to living out our baptism in daily life. Here are tested ways to get down to what the baptized actually do day by day. It is an approach that: **works for every member** – other resources are limited by their method – e.g., calling on members at work reaches only those whom someone, usually the rector, has time to visit; Sunday morning witnesses to “how I found God I found in _____” reaches only the witnesses and their hearers, etc.

includes all the areas of daily life – not only our work but also our home, our local community, the wider world, our leisure, our spiritual health, and our part in our church's life and its outreach

discerns a specific action in deed and word for each area of life – we need to get to what we will actually do and / or say now in each area of life to make life more loving or more just now – this specific action in deed or word becomes the member's mission there (for this use of mission, go to www.membermission.org > Making the Vision Work > Basic Tools > Basic Tools 1-3D, 5 and 10)

organizes church life around supporting the members in their daily missions as its primary purpose – at least, one of its primary purposes

Note that on June 25, 2008 we discussed member mission with our **Presiding Bishop, Katharine Jefferts Schori**. She was glad to hear of it and found it new among current resources for ministry in daily life. She requested a paper from us for the September 2008 meeting of the Episcopal House of Bishops which would explore the future of theological education. Our paper was to outline how member mission can support a new way in theological education. Initial feedback indicates it was well received by them.
